This summer marks the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our fraternity.

What greater legacy can we give our profession than the creation of new music for our medium. We all know of individuals and band programs that have commissioned numerous new works for band, many which have become staples in the repertoire. While this might be a long-range project due to financial resources needed, everyone can benefit from your commission. Kudos go out to all the chapters that were involved in commissioning Mark Camphouse on HOMAGE TO A DREAM, in celebration of the 75th anniversary of Phi Beta Mu.

If you do not have a Hall of Fame for your chapter, I would like to encourage you to start one. Not only does it recognize those outstanding individuals who were the foundation for the programs in your state or province, but it provides a history of the development of bands in your area. The International Board will be undertaking a project to interview "icons" of the band world, to record their thoughts on various topics. It is essential that we document the wisdom and knowledge of those who create the high water marks of our profession. Not only will there be a series of consistent questions that all will be asked, but they will then be given an opportunity to address anything that they feel is important that has not been previously covered.

Phi Beta Mu has always done a great job of recognizing and honoring superior achievement throughout all aspects of our profession. We should all be more involved in promulgating bands and mentoring colleagues. We get out of Phi Beta Mu what we put into it. Time is the most important non-renewable human resource. How we spend time reflects what we deem important. I encourage all chapters to record your history and hope all individuals will share your talents with someone less experienced. The experiences resulting from the time you give will continue to resonate as it ripples toward the future.
